All the other lessons the Invisible Man learned were helpful to him in finding himself and ⁱⁿ getting along in the world, but only his first lesson, that made him realize that the black radical movement needs an easy-going dignity and pride, was of any true importance. Unfortunately the Invisible Man disappears in reality before he has a chance to put his plans for moderation in black radical politics into action. We feel sympathy for Ellison's fictional existential figure, but cannot truly mourn his disappearance. He was meant as an example for others to follow; and in some cases he is an example of what to avoid as a black man, who wants to see his idealistic desire and dreams become reality.
